Announcement of 2024–2025 Sōshitsu Sen XV Distinguished Lecture on Japanese Culture

Etoki (Picture-Storytellers) from Japan Performance and Music by Yamaoka Bumyō, Masuda Eishin, and Nagino Akihito, With Hanging Scrolls of the Life of Prince Shōtoku

Tuesday, March 11, 2025, at the Forum at Columbia University

A thousand-year-old tradition of *etoki* (picture-storytelling) will be presented in North America for the first time, with three etoki masters, who will present the life of Prince Shōtoku, the legendary founder of Buddhism in Japan. The event begins with the oldest tradition of picture-telling, transmitted at the Shitennōji Temple, which was established by Prince Shōtoku himself. Next is a performance of "superetoki," incorporating new media. Last is a performance with the traditional biwa (lute). Fourteen hanging scrolls of *The Life of Prince Shōtoku* will be exhibited at the venue.

The "Sen" Lecture will be held on Tuesday, March 11, 2025, at the Forum at Columbia University, which is located at 605 West 125th Street, New York, New York 10025. The exhibition of Prince Shōtoku Paintings opens at 5 PM EDT, and the main performance starts at 6 PM EDT.
